Politics

The intent of A Level Politics is to help students understand the evolving political environment in the UK and USA. Students studying it will gain core knowledge and understanding of politics both in practice and in theory. In lessons they will examine the workings of democracy and government as well as political philosophy which has shaped the country and continues to do so. During their time they will be expected to keep up to date with current affairs and political issues and have the opportunity to voice their opinions. They will be expected to organise and run a "mock election" for the entire Sixth Form and there will be an opportunity to visit Parliament.

Politics A Level does not have course work but students will be assessed throughout the course, ready for their final exams in year 13. They will learn how to write effectively and concisely, using their own knowledge and a range of landmark and contemporary examples to form substantiated judgements. They will learn to analyse political commentary and opinion, passing judgement on the big issues of the day. They will also be coached in improving their oracy, making sure that they are also effective and eloquent speakers as well as mature writers.

We aim to equip our young people with the tools to be fully participating members of the country's political system, at a time where participation is low. We want to ensure they are able to make their own informed and educated decisions when it comes to the ballot box, as well as challenge the narrative and rhetoric that they are exposed to by the media and government. We intend to build a range of skills in politics that will help students achieve their full potential in any career they choose, as we cannot escape politics in any walk of life.
