## STEM visit to Hinkley Point C



During December, as part of our STEM program, nine students from Years 9 to 12 accompanied Mr Jones and Mrs McCarthy on a site tour of the nuclear power station being constructed in Somerset. Hinkley Point C will be the third power station on the site which is located on the Bristol Channel and will house two nuclear islands (reactors) that will together supply 7% of the country's electricity generation needs. The site is being built by EDF Energy in order to generate sustainable electricity without relying on fossil fuels, and the sheer scale of the £22 Billion investment and construction effort was staggering. The site is 4 years into a 10 year build, and in addition to the power station itself, they have constructed a 1500 room hotel, sports and health facilities, new roads and roundabouts, a docking jetty and a new sea wall that stretches over 750 metres in length.

The site is so big (245 football pitches) that it has 3 park and ride services just for construction workers, an 800 seater canteen and they have their own fleet of buses that transport workers around the site. Excavators have completed several 'deep digs' which have buried pipework and concrete far beneath ground level. Some of this pipework contains pipes large enough for cars to drive through, and recently three

tunnelling machines have arrived on site that will drill for more than 3km out into the channel. We saw that a good portion of the construction site houses a specialist concrete factory, with two full time Doctors of Concrete employed to formulate the precise chemistry of materials needed to house the nuclear elements of the site. The construction of the reactor foundations required 76 hours of continuous pouring of concrete.

On site, quality control is so important that many items are built above ground in purpose-built bunkers before being inspected and eventually dropped into position using 'Big Carl' – the world's biggest crane which is now resident on site for the next 4 years.

This crane has its own rail track so it can move using its 94 wheels! The whole site has a 'right first time' attitude.

We learned that huge consideration has been made with regard to local residents too as £20 million has been set aside to improve roads, cycle paths, schools and playgrounds, and more than 60% of the construction contracts were awarded to local businesses. It was also good to hear that the local 'Nuclear College' has also received investment in order to train some of the 900 staff who will eventually work in and around the power station. Currently there are 400 apprentices on site (with their own building and facilities too) and they are looking to recruit 600 more over the next few years.

Overall it was a spectacular visit, and one that we will make again to inspire students who want to work in Physics, Electronics or power generation.

## Somerville College

On Wednesday 4 December, Mrs Balmer took myself and eight other Sixth Form students to visit Somerville College which is part of Oxford University.

On arrival, we were greeted by a former student who talked to us about what university is like and in particular how Oxford University works. This talk was very informative and she answered any concerns and questions we had.

Following on from this, we then had a brief tour of the quads of Somerville College. We were shown the Library and Chapel (which was inclusive of everyone's beliefs/religion) and saw the extensive accommodation available to the students. Our tour guide, who is a current student, also gave us some background history of Somerville. It was one of the first universities to accept women, and is proudly a very accepting community now.

After this, we visited the canteen

for lunch. There was a variety of delicious food for everyone and we ate in the wood panelled dining hall which was very large and accommodated everyone. The atmosphere was very relaxed and accepting. Once we had finished we took a trip to the natural history museum, which is actually part of the University as many of their science and history lectures take place there. This is just one of the many amazing resources Oxford offers, along with facilities such as College libraries, sports facilities and numerous clubs and societies.

To finish the day we had a taster session with one of the University lecturers, who specialised in medicine and worked with us on the imaging of the heart for cancer research. Although completely different to the style of teaching we are all used to, it was definitely very refreshing to experience what university will be like for us. Overall, the day was very interesting and





allowed us to see all the opportunities that come with university, and it has encouraged us to aim high!

#### **Design in Action**

This year we had our first ever Year 9 trip to Birmingham to look into the application of design in the different areas of design technology—fashion, food, graphics, resistant materials and technology.

The students had set tasks to carry out during the trip and fed back their answers when they returned.

In food they had the experience of eating in different eateries as well as visiting the food hall in Selfridges that was buzzing with Christmas ideas. The presentation and flavours of food was a great experience for them.



In Textiles they had a wide selection of shops to visit and research current trends, window displays, and current events as well as future trends.

In Resistant materials the students researched into window displays, location of shops and proximity, products on sale as well as shop fronts.

In graphics the students explored different materials used in construction, the transport system as well as access to different shops eg disabled transport.

The students were exceptionally well behaved and had a fab time. They thoroughly enjoyed the visit and carried out the set tasks superbly.

#### Bookbuzz 2019

Each year we take part in Bookbuzz, a scheme run by The Book Trust and sponsored by children's book publishers. The aim of the scheme is to encourage and inspire children to enjoy reading, by giving them a book of their own, and introducing them to new authors and genres. Every Year 7 student makes their own choice from a core selection of 15 titles which have been carefully chosen by a group of librarians and teachers.

After looking at the Bookbuzz website to read first chapters, and looking at the core collection in the Library, our students made their choices by 4 October, and then had to wait (some quite impatiently!) for delivery.

On Friday 15 November the wait was over, and books were distributed with a special treat, the Year 7 Bookbuzz Breakfast. Instead of their Eng-

lish lessons that morning, students came to the Hall for pastries and drink, then listened to Year 8 students reading extracts from some of the books. We hope this will have encouraged students to read more than their own book!

All the books in the collection will be available to borrow from the Library. The students can do Accelerated Reader quizzes on the books, earning double points for quizzes passed! Plus

extra House points for students who read and pass quizzes on more than three of the books!

Most importantly, we really do hope that the Year 7 students will enjoy reading the book they chose and will be encouraged to read on.

#### **Joffre White**

On Tuesday 22 October Joffre White, Author, UK Patron of Reading, and an Ambassador for Achievement For All, visited for the day. His talk to KS3, 'The Power of Words', covered his journey from how he got into reading as a child, to eventually becoming an author. He talked about how reading can open up so many worlds to students, and how words have the power to give so much knowledge and entertainment as well as to hurt, giving students lots to think about and reflect on. 



